Adopt-A-Tree Program Guidelines and Application

The Sierra Madre Department of Public Works welcomes the donation of funds and efforts to maintain the Community's Urban Forest. Adopt-A-Tree applications are available on the City's website and at City Hall, 232 West Sierra Madre Blvd. Tree planting is a major commitment that should be seriously considered by the homeowner. Members of the Sierra Madre Adopt-A-Tree program will be assisted in the planting of a new street tree if the applicant agrees to abide by the following guidelines:

- 1. Application for tree planting must be made to the Public Works Department.
- 2. Applicants must show proof of ownership of the subject (adjacent) property.
- 3. A member of the city's Energy, Environment, and Natural Resources Commission and/or Public Works staff will meet with the applicant at the subject address to determine the proper tree species and placement.
- 4. Only approved street trees shall be planted (see attached list).
- 5. The planting of trees shall be done by the City's Arborist Contractor.
- The homeowner agrees to water and maintain the tree so as to increase the tree's chance of survival. It may take over a year of weekly watering (depending on selected species) before a tree is fully established and able to survive without regular watering.
- 7. For health and safety reasons, new parkway trees must be planted in allocation that is:
 - At least 10 feet from overhead utility lines (this will effect species selection; smaller trees at maturity will be utilized under overhead utilities).
 - At least 15 feet from fire hydrants or street lights.
 - At least 25 feet from street corners or street signs.
 - A minimum of 30 feet from any other tree. This provides for optimum space for the new tree to grow to maturity.
 - A minimum of 5 feet from any driveway.
- 8. Tree species selection shall be based on available space, availability of nursery stock, and understory conditions.
- 9. Tree planting size shall be 15 gallon container.
- 10. Cost will vary based on species selected, applicant shall pay for the tree and planting (at City's cost, no markup) prior to planting.
